History of Our School





Linton Primary School is situated 30km south west of Ballarat. As a State Government Primary School it has served the Linton Township and its rural hinterland since 1867. In 2017 the school joined with the local community in celebrating 150 years of primary education at Linton Primary School.

The focus at Linton Primary School is to create a happy, healthy learning environment. The curriculum at Linton provides instruction in all of the eight key learning areas based on the Victorian Curriculum - English, Mathematics, Science, the Arts, Physical Education, Technology, Humanities and Chinese Language.


The class structure at Linton Primary School is currently years Foundation to Year 2 in one class and Years 3 to Year 6 in another class. The Library lessons are complimented by a Mobile Area Resource Center (MARC) Van which visits once a week.

Parents play an important role in the operation of our school as 'Parent Helpers' within the school and through participation in School Council and the Parents and Friends Fundraising Group.

Our school is situated on spacious well-kept grounds within a peaceful bush setting. The grounds are maintained with the assistance of a groundskeeper, parents and families, providing a pleasant, relaxed learning environment.

Linton Primary School has a strong focus on Information and Communication Technology as an integrated part of all curriculum areas. The school currently has a ratio of 1:1 student-to-computer which is equal to the state average.

In 2020 the school received funding to improve the grounds and building to make our environment more bushfire safe. The school building is a Shelter In Place. This has provided the staff and children of Linton Primary with the benefits of a safe place should a bushfire come our way. We have also received funding of \$1.978 million dollars to upgrade the internal buildings in 2021/2022. This is a very exciting project which is well underway. Building construction will begin in March 2022 - students will continue learning onsite with as little disruption as possible. Some parts of the school or grounds will be closed for short periods of time but during our Shelter in place upgrade, the students showed great resilience and thoroughly enjoyed watching the construction process.






Aims & Objectives

- Play safely


Revising and Reviewing the Student Engagement Policy

Our school is a School Wide Positive Behaviour school which is a set of student agreed expectations and treats non-compliance as an opportunity for learning and re-learning! Whilst the model still contains natural consequences, it is a move away from a detention-based model which punishes students for non-compliance. We have a thumbs up reward system where students are provided a token when they demonstrate one the three SWPB values of respect, responsibility or safety. The students are thoroughly delighted when their positive behaviours are noted and celebrated and posted on a board in the front foyer of the school entrance.

School Routine



Students must be at school by 8:50 am for exercise as a whole school

Learning commences - 9.00am

Lunch - 12.30pm to 1.15pm (supervised eating of lunch 12.30 - 12.45pm)
Afternoon Recess - 2.15pm - 2.30pm
Dismissal - 3.30pm

Staff supervise the playground from 8.40am. School finishes at 3.30pm, with the yard supervised until 3:45p.m. Please collect children promptly and we appreciate a phone call if you have been unavoidably detained.

Telephone

As most of the staff are teaching during the day, it would be appreciated if calls could be made before or after school.

Routine for Prep during February

Prep children are not required to attend school on Wednesdays during February. We hope your child's Prep year marks the beginning of a rewarding educational relationship with our school.

Emergency Management / Bushfire Risk

Linton Primary School is a 'Category 2' school on the Department of Education's Bushfire at Risk Register. This means that there are several provisions that are activated at different levels of alert:

code Red days and no alternative program is offered.

EXTREME (Vic Emergency Fire Danger Rating): The Linton Primary School site is closed but an alternative program is offered at Delacombe Primary School. Families are asked at the beginning of the fire season and at the start of the year to indicate whether their child(ren) will attend or stay home to activate their personal bushfire plan.

DAYS OF TOTAL FIRE BAN (CFA Victoria): Excursions will be cancelled.

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Other measures are taken based on local conditions. For example, the oval may be closed in high winds and inside play offered during heavy rain or extreme heat conditions.

Supervision of Children

Children are supervised at all times whilst at school and on excursions. If you find it necessary to take your child from the playground during a break, please notify the duty teacher of your intention and sign the child out on the appropriate form at the front of the office.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund is made available to families holding Health Care Concession cards. Information and application forms can be obtained from the school Office. The school prioritises using these funds for camps and the swimming program.

Conveyance Allowance

A Conveyance Allowance is available to parents where travel more than 4.8kms on the shortest possible route to get their student to their nearest school. Further details can be obtained from the School Office.



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Enrolments

Children who turn five on or before 30th April are eligible to be accepted into Prep. Enrolments can occur anytime throughout the year for students who move into the area. Students enrolling in Government schools must attend their nearest local school.

Transfer:

- When children are transferring from another school, a transfer is required. If you can forward copies of reports and record cards, this would be helpful for the teacher to assess the child and plan for their learning needs.
- When a child transfers to another school a transfer notice is mailed to the new school.

General Information

Permission Notes/Excursions

The School participates in a number of excursions in and around the district and Ballarat throughout the year. Permission is required for all children to participate in any out of school Excursions or School Camps. Full details of all excursions will be sent to Parents prior to the event.

Unless otherwise indicated, spending money or mobile phones are not be taken on excursions.

School Absences

The Department of Education and Training requires that parents supply to the School an explanation of each day of absence by 9:30 a.m. A telephone call, text message or email to the school on the morning of the absence is required.

Lost Property

The Department of Education does not compensate nor hold responsibility for any items that a child may bring to school and is either lost or damaged. Please name all items, articles of clothing, jumpers and coats. These are often removed and put down outside during Recess and Lunch times and become 'forgotten items'. The Lost Property basket is located on the back porch. Each year we accumulate a large number of unclaimed items.



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School Crossing

Children must wait until traffic has stopped before moving onto the school crossing. Please encourage your child to observe these rules and use the crossing correctly when the flags are out. Students must take care at all times. Bicycles must be wheeled, NOT RIDDEN across the school crossing.

Bicycles and Scooters

Bicycles and scooters must not be ridden in any part of the School Ground. All cyclists must wear a bike helmet. Children should not borrow bicycles or allow them to be borrowed. Bicycles and scooters must be wheeled NOT RIDDEN across the school crossing.

School Lunches

Please pack a realistic quantity of lunch for your child to eat. Children are supervised eating their lunch and any uneaten food will be sent home.

Each child is expected to have their own lunch box clearly named. No drinks in glass containers as a matter of safety for all. Once a week, students are able to bring a foil-wrapped lunch for heating in the pie-warmer (currently Wednesdays). Please clearly name the pie warmer food. Canteen is Thursday, orders must be brought back to school no later than Wednesday morning. Order forms can be collected from the school office or class teacher.

School Sports

The Linton & District School Sports Association (LDSSA) holds an annual sports meeting at the Linton Recreation Reserve, during March/April, with the following schools participating: Linton, Napoleons, Cape Clear and Woady Yaloak (Ross Creek, Smythesdale, Scarsdale & Snake Valley campuses).

All children compete in the sports and Linton students participate in school uniform with runners. (No child can compete without footwear) A notice with all the details and a program will be sent out to parents prior to the event.



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School Camp

School Camp will be conducted annually for Grades 3-6. There are times when a sleepover at school will occur particularly when COVID restrictions prevent camps from continuing. Sleep over is for years 1 to 3 and years 4 to 6 on separate nights.

School Photos

Individual and class photos will be taken during the year and parents are given the option to purchase these.

Book Club

Throughout the year, children may buy books through the Scholastic Australia Book Club. This is not compulsory; however it does encourage children's reading development and provides the opportunity for parents to share the reading experience at home.


Fortnightly Newsletters

The Newsletter keeps parents informed of all important information, dates and coming events. Grade Expert Parent Portal is now available to parents, the portal will hold all important information and should be checked regularly.

Usually, notices or notes are also sent home on a Wednesday, please check your child's bag. Newsletters will be available on the Parent portal and school website unless a request for a hard copy is made. Please contact the Office if you require a hard copy.

Remote and flexible learning during COVID lockdowns

From time to time there may be a school lockdown. Our junior students use Seesaw for all our online learning and the senior students use TEAMS for their online learning and Webex. Students of essential workers and those who fall under the category of being vulnerable, attend onsite during lockdowns and are supervised by a teacher. All students will receive online learning regardless of being at school or at home from 9:00 am to 12:30 pm. Our staff contact parents and students on a regular basis to ensure learning is being achieved or to adjust learning to suit the needs of the student and the family circumstances at that time. Our staff also deliver lovely surprises to letterboxes during remote learning to keep students and families connected to the school.





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Communication.

The school uses Grade Expert as the preferred form for notices and contact with parents. Please make sure you check your emails daily. We will contact you through the mobile phone or school phone for urgent matters either through text messages or direct discussions. Staff are available after school at the school gates for 10 minutes most nights to meet and greet you. For any formal discussions, please make an appointment with your class teacher at a time that is suitable to all parties. If your matter is urgent, please contact the school immediately so we can work as a team to put the supports in place. Please don't hesitate to call us to share and celebrate any extra curricular activities that your child has excelled in or enjoyed or if you wish to pass on information that you particularly have enjoyed hearing about, we love good news stories.

Working with children check

Any parent or volunteer within the school, must supply a valid Working With Children Check prior to any activity they have offered to help with. Volunteer Working with Children Checks are free and can be done online. You will also need to sign our 'Linton primary school Child Safety Code of Conduct" form ensuring that volunteers will follow our child safety rules at our school and keep our children safe at all times.

School Concert

In the last two weeks of the school year, the school may host an end of year Concert with Christmas Carols depending on restrictions for gatherings. This is usually held at the Linton Recreation Reserve but can be held at the school on the oval. This event provides a wonderful family-friendly evening of entertainment.



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General Health

Regular attendance assists with effective learning, and social connectedness, and development.

- School is a place for happy, healthy children. If your child is not well, please keep him/her home until they are well. Home is the best place for a sick child.
- If your child gets sick at school, you will be contacted and asked to take your child home.
- ❖ Early notification of medical conditions such as deafness, poor eyesight, nervous disorders, and bladder or bowel weakness is a great help to teachers and may save your child embarrassment.
- ❖ If your child needs to leave the school for a particular reason (e.g. Dental/Medical appointment) a written note signed by the parent should be sent to the class teacher. Children must be collected from their classroom.

Emergency Contacts

On enrolment, parents must complete a confidential Student Information Form, for reference when the child is sick or injured. Please notify your child's teacher or the school office if there are any changes in your family circumstances throughout the year.

Illness & Injury

Accidents are recorded in the First Aid Book. If a child is injured or seriously ill, parents will be contacted so they can source appropriate treatment. When parents cannot be contacted, or if staff judge it a critical incident, the school will take the appropriate emergency action. In any event, parents will be notified at the earliest opportunity.



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Medication

- ❖ If Medication must be taken at school, please discuss it beforehand with your child's teacher and complete a permission to administer medication form at the office.
- Send clearly named medicine with directions and time for dosage to the first aid officer or class teacher.
- ❖ If medication is to be administered by staff on an ongoing basis, an additional Student Medical Condition form will need to be filled out and details of the prescription and administration instructions supplied by your doctor.
- ❖ An updated Asthma plan must be provided at the beginning of each year as well as appropriate asthma medication.
- Anaphylaxis an updated plan must be provided to the school at the beginning of each year or if situations change along with an in-date epipen.

Head Lice

Head lice are a common occurrence in schools and spread by hair-to-hair contact. When head lice are detected by either parents or the school, students with live lice are required to be excluded until treated. The Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations 2009 allow for students to be returned to school after treatment has commenced.

Immunisation Requirements

Before your child can be admitted to any Primary School an Immunisation certificate must be obtained from the Environmental Health Office or your Doctor. If confirms that your child has been immunised against: **Tetanus**, **Diphtheria**, **Polio**, **Measles and Mumps**.

Should an outbreak occur in the school of one of the above diseases, a Child without a certificate or one who has not been immunised can be excluded for a period of time.









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<u>Infectious Diseases – Exclusion of Pupils</u>

The following is information summarized from material provided by the Department of Health.

Diarrhoea, Gastro

Children must remain at home until 24 hours after the last loose bowel motion and or vomiting symptoms have ceased or until a medical certificate is produced. Vomiting is not specifically excluded, but please observe commonsense if your child has been vomiting all night!

Chicken Pox

Children must remain at home until fully recovered (some remaining scabs are not a reason for continued exclusion).

School Sores

Children must remain at home until appropriate treatment has commenced. Sores on exposed surfaces must be covered by a watertight dressing.

<u>Mumps</u>

Children must remain home until fully recovered.

Measles/Rubella

Children must remain at home for 7 days from the appearance of the rash.

Whooping Cough

Children must remain home for 4 weeks or until a Medical Certificate of recovery is produced.

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Curriculum

Victorian Curriculum F-10

Linton Primary School follows the Victorian Curriculum guidelines. We have whole school plans for Literacy, Mathematics, Science, Health and Physical Education which staff use as a guide to help planning each term. We offer Chinese as our language of choice.

English

Early Years is taught in the Prep, 1 & 2 Class Room. This program builds up the children's skills in the area of Speaking/Listening/Reading and Writing. Children work in small groups, being matched to text and work on activities based on their needs. Sessions incorporate Guided Reading sessions, which allow teachers to support students in developing individual reading strategies. Senior years - English is taught through the use of Technology, one to one lap tops and programs such as TEAMS and the Microsoft 365 suite. Multi media text and being able to navigate websites is an integral part of Reading and writing. Students are taught about plagiarism and checking the validity of websites to ensure they contain accurate information and are genuine. Children are encouraged to take reading material home each night and to make use of our well-resourced library.


Maths

Emphasis is placed on;

- Co-operative and cross-age work
- > Use of concrete materials
- > Discussing and sharing ideas
- Games and activities to develop automatic response
- Children seeing a purpose to Maths i.e. linking to the 'real world'
- A variety of sources are used, including online resources such as IXL Maths and Study Ladder

Art

Children will be involved in many enjoyable experiences in Art, which are sometimes messy. The school provides an art smock for such activities.





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Library & MARC Van

The School has a modern Library that aims;

- ✓ To develop independent readers who want to read, and enjoy reading.
- ✓ To expose students to a wide range of experiences through literature The Mobile Area Resource Center (MARC) Van comes to the School every week and the children are able to borrow books. Children are encouraged to borrow regularly from both libraries.

All children must have a library bag to transfer books safely to and from the shelves. Damaged/lost books must be reported to the library teacher. Replacement costs for lost books will be charged to the parent.



Reading

Junior students - Parents are encouraged to read with, read to and be read by their students to develop reading skills each night. This could sometimes mean hearing words or alphabet letters. It is recommended that children read from 10 mins to 25 mins according to their age, every school night.

Senior students are expected to read independently for 25 to 40 mins each night. You may wish to read a page each and share reading to promote the love of reading and as wonderful way to stay connected with your child. Reading should never become a chore or cause distress, if this occurs please speak to your class teacher.





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Computers & Technology

All classrooms are equipped with computers for student use on a 1:1 ratio. Children have access to a wide range of programs and the older children are encouraged to use the MS Office suite of Word, Excel, Publisher, PowerPoint TEAMS programs, in conjunction with their everyday curriculum.

We also use iPads to support learning in the junior school.

WebEX video-conferencing for collaboration and 'virtual' field trips form part of the curriculum and often occur in Science or Integrated studies.



Internet

The internet is a vast resource with great potential for education. Using the Internet we can communicate with people all over the world, through e-mail and by accessing vast amounts of information that give educational opportunities. Cyber safety and internet protocols are taught in the first term of each school year and as a continual topic throughout the year to all students.

Access for the children is limited by an external filter, thus minimizing the risk of children accessing inappropriate sites. When your children are using their devices at home, please make sure you are overseeing the content they are accessing and that they use their device in a public area for maximum safety. The biggest risk of online bullying may come from social media sites and web based gaming platforms. We encourage parents to be aware at all times of the sites, games and social platforms that your children are accessing. If you come across anything that is a worry, please block the person and discuss the issue with your child and notify the teacher so we can follow up cyber safety awareness at school. Any inappropriate content should be immediately directed to the Police.



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Homework

Linton Primary School's homework consists of home reading between 15 and 35 mins each school night. We encourage you to talk about Mathematics in real life at home such as setting the table, counting the cutlery and telling the time. Set homework should aim to;

- > Link home and school in supporting your child's learning
- Help develop your child's organisation, time management and selfdiscipline skills
- > Reinforce work undertaken in class
- > Enrich reading
- > Reinforce spelling and mathematical number concepts i.e. tables

Swimming

Each year the whole school is involved in a Swimming Program. In 2021, this is planned for Term III at a Ballarat aquatic venue. Costs and dates will be published via the school newsletter and relevant permission forms.



Parent Teacher Interviews & Student Reports

Student Reports are written and issued twice a year. These will be at the end of Term 2 and Term 4.

Parent Teacher Interviews are conducted after the release of mid-year reports. This provides parents and teachers with the opportunity to come together and formally discuss a child's progress. Interviews are student run to provide your child the opportunity to celebrate their learning.

Please note: A parent or teacher may request an interview any time throughout the year that is mutually convenient to share concerns or celebrations. Interviews can be made by telephone, virtual or face to face.

Education is a shared Role

Education is shared between home and school. As parents, you have already taught your child to speak.

When teaching your child to speak, you may have used the following tools by way of encouragement -


- ✓ You spoke to your children often.

 They learnt to smile, gurgle and respond to your voice.
- ✓ You encouraged their response.
 They tried to copy your word and patterns of speech
 You were patient, yet enthusiastic
- ✓ You Praised their attempts at saying word
 They were often not quite correct in their attempts
 You encouraged all their efforts, especially those which were nearly correct
- ✓ You shared your experiences with them.

 Those family outings to the beach, a trip to the zoo, helping with cooking or cleaning the car. They built up an increasingly wide range of vocabulary. You were eager to point out and explain things using more new words.

Progress in learning to speak took time and patience. Remember the amusing incidents when they used the wrong words or mixed up their sentences - you didn't growl at them for these mistakes. They gradually corrected themselves.

The learning model you provided in teaching them to speak was a very effective model.





Some Suggestion for Parents

Parents are always looking for ways of helping children do well at school. You may wish to consider some of these suggestions:

- ✓ Help the child feel good about themselves and about learning. Encourage every effort. Praise efforts and success regularly.
- ✓ Give birthday or Christmas presents of simply written and well-illustrated books on a whole range of topics both fiction and information books
- Encourage the children to write regularly in a variety of ways letters, diaries, factual accounts, imaginative short stories, etc.
- ✓ With the younger children especially, try to cultivate a sense of number, size, length, height, width, volume, area, weight and time in everyday life. Join with them in estimating, counting, calculating and so on.
- ✓ Take time to discuss every day happenings. Encourage questions and show how answers can be found.

Regularly give them one of the most precious gifts you can...YOUR TIME.



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Reading

Here are some things you can do, to help your child READ.

1. Read to your Child often

Nursery rhymes, picture books, simple stories and poems. Children have to learn the language of books, just as they have learnt their spoken language. They may not understand all that you read to them (so talk with your child about the book).

2. Encourage their responses

Encourage them to

- o Complete the ends of lines in nursery rhymes
- o Point out things in picture books
- o Join in the lines of stories "Fe, fi, fo fum..."
- o Turn the pages and suggest what might happen next

3. Praise their attempts

You didn't insist on perfection at first in their speech so praise their first attempts at reading a word, giving an idea etc. Eventually the correct reading will emerge.

4. Share book experiences with them.

A whole new world of experiences can be shared through books. New vocabulary will be found, new ideas shared and old ideas and places relived.

Experiences are important in building children's vocabulary and background knowledge. Books read to children can help in enriching and extending these.

As well as the "book language" learnt at this time, children who are read to regularly, develop a positive attitude towards reading. This love of books is a powerful incentive for children to want to learn to read for themselves. It encourages children to talk about their own books, helping them enjoy educational success.

Pupil Free Days

Schools are allocated four pupil-free days per year for curriculum development and teacher professional learning, of which one is always the first day of the year. On these days, school will be closed for students. Advanced notification will be given of these closures via the newsletter and at school assemblies.
